Introduction

The Dempster Corridor Plan Survey was one of several outreach and engagement activities conducted to learn from residents and community members as part of the Village of Morton Grove's corridor planning effort.

Open for approximately six weeks—from June 25 to August 3, 2025—the survey received a total of 348 responses. More details on the demographics of respondents are provided in the pages that follow, with a few highlights in the sidebar at the right.

The survey was widely promoted, starting at the community workshop where it first launched. In the following weeks, it was shared via the Village website and communications at Morton Grove Days, and on various community Facebook groups.

All survey results are summarized in this document and will be used to help inform recommendations that are drafted in the next phase of the planning process.

Key Themes & Findings



More points of interest that invite people to stop and stay on Dempster

Increase variety of shopping, dining, and entertainment destinations, particularly those that are family-friendly and cater to all ages. Overall, respondents want attractive and community-oriented spaces with convenient parking.

Safe, walkable, and attractive streets that are pedestrian-oriented

Create a sidewalk environment that encourages people to walk along Dempster and feel safe doing it. Consider how accessible infrastructure, streetscape improvements, and signage/wayfinding can enhance street and sidewalk activity.





Fill in the gaps to create a bustling, vibrant corridor

Underutilized or vacant space/storefronts on Dempster have the potential to be mixed-use development that targets housing for people who work in Morton Grove and young professionals.




Better connections and less traffic congestion for all modes of transportation




What race or ethnicity do you identify with?





Respondents were majority White (78%), followed by Asian/Asian American (11%), and Hispanic or Latino (6%). Almost half of respondents are in the 35-54 age bracket and a little more than a third are between ages 55-74, providing a range of perspectives and different user experiences of Dempster.


What is your age?




Note: While this is not a statistically significant survey, comparing respondent demographics with Village-wide demographics indicate that White respondents and those ages 20-54 may be over-represented in the survey results, while while younger and older groups may be under-represented.

46% of respondents have lived in/been a part of Morton Grove for 20+ years. The second highest response rate came from newer residents (21% between 1 and 5 years), followed by residents between 6-10 years (17%), representing responses from a mix of new and longtime community members.


How often do you currently shop for these items along the Dempster Corridor?



If new housing were to be developed in the non-residential areas of Dempster, what types would fit best into the Dempster Corridor context?

The majority of responses (68%) voted for mixeduse development with commercial on the ground floor and residential units above. Smaller scale multi-unit housing options received the second highest number of votes (44%). Note: the below images were not included in the survey.







How do you currently travel to places along the Dempster Corridor?





Over three-quarters (76%) of respondents drive daily when visiting places along Dempster. 39% walk daily or weekly to the corridor. Respondents rarely take Pace Bus or the Pulse Dempster Line. Based on anecdotal input from the community workshop, Morton Grove residents are more likely to take Pulse Dempster Line on an occasional basis when traveling to O'Hare Airport.





How do you wish you could travel to places along the Dempster Corridor in the future?

In the previous question, the majority of respondents drive daily to Dempster, but in the future they hope to drive less and walk or bike more. Respondents also hope to take the Pace Bus/Pulse Dempster Line or Metra more often during the week or month.







37% find it easy to park on Dempster, while 63% find it somewhat or very difficult to find parking.






What transportation improvements are most needed for Dempster's future?










Do you use the municipal parking lots along Dempster?




79% of survey respondents do not use the existing municipal parking lots
